1. THE COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

These courses equip the students with the up to date knowledge that allow them to cross steadily to the future and be highly competitive in the job market. Electronics and Communication Technicians from this program will be able to undertake projects that include the deployment and maintenance of telecommunication networks, giving technical support and participating in establishing and building of new oil and gas plants, power plants, airports, hospitals and health care centers, all of which are of central importance to Oman.
