1. COURSE OUTLINE

This course aims to introduce students to the fundamentals of linguistic analysis. It begins with an exploration of the nature of language and the academic ways of thinking about issues relating to language structure and use. Students will learn about the basic units and systems of language - from sound to word to meaning to grammatical systems. As this course does not presuppose any prior knowledge of linguistics, it will allow students to explore the intricacies of language systems and at the same time give students enough background to cover the topics in more advanced courses.

2. AIMS

The course aims to:

- Introduce students to the field of Linguistics.
- Introduce students to the sub-disciplines of linguistics (e.g. morphology, syntax and semantics)
- Provide students with a sound understanding of how language is structured.
- Equip students with basic skills needed to apply linguistic analysis.
- Use critical thinking to reflect on the social and cultural effects on communication.
