#### 1. COURSE OUTLINE

This course aims to survey the development of the English language from past to the present day. The course discusses the attitudes towards language change and mechanisms of linguistic change. The course aims to examine the structure and vocabulary of English through different periods: Old English, Middle English, Early Modern English, and Modern English. The course focuses on changes in phonology, morphology, syntax, orthography, semantics, and lexicon. The course also considers some social and political factors affecting the language.

#### 2. AIMS

The course aims to:

- Familiarize students with the mechanisms and nature of language change.
- Equip students with sound understanding of the origins of the English language as compared to other languages of the world.
- Enable students to understand the major stages and changes in the development of English from a synthetic to an analytic language.
- Enable students to explore the cultural, social and political events that accompanied and influenced the English language.
