1. COURSE OUTLINE

Veterinary Internship is undertaken after finishing 4th year in the Veterinary Medicine Program. The course provides mentored, experiential clinical training for veterinarians seeking to advance their clinical competence. The course is designed to develop the technical competence of the intern and provide training opportunities on a broad range of elective and entry-level procedures. The intern is provided a comprehensive orientation to all aspects of the hospital or practice. Participation in daily rounds and case reviews with the clinician instructor is an essential component of the internship training.

This course aims to provide the intern with a broad range of relevant and current clinical experiences while under appropriate supervision. It provides an appropriate level of responsibility for patient care and client service. The course also provides an appropriate training environment with adequate clinical and educational resources.
